Carolinas Communication Association invites submissions for proposals and papers spanning all methods and aspects of communication studies methods and interests for presentation at the regional CCA Annual Conference, October 10–11, 2025, in Raleigh, North Carolina. While our organization represents scholarship from North Carolina, South Carolina, and around the region, we welcome all submissions.

Conference Theme: Communicating as Neighbors in Community

The theme of the 2025 Carolina Communication Convention centers on the communication concept of neighboring, a practice neglected in our postmodern, fragmented co-cultures and society. For rhetors, how do we create an activist stance to encourage neighboring practices? For interpersonal, organizational, and health communicators, how do we enable the creation of neighboring communities in our spheres of influence? For public relations practitioners, how do we create neighbors among our publics? For educators, how do we create equitable educational experiences and make our students feel home? For the under-ever-more-scrutiny mass/media communicators, how can we bring diverse audiences together? How can we all heed the counsel of Marting Luther King, Jr. who said, "The good neighbor looks beyond the external accidents and discerns those inner qualities that make all . . . human and, therefore, brothers [and sisters]?

CCA is dedicated to supporting academic research in its many contexts. As such, while we encourage participants to submit work that examines neighboring, it is not required. We are an organization that proudly supports all levels of academic work:

- Undergraduate and graduate students are invited to submit research papers or posters.
- Faculty are invited to submit research papers.
- Faculty are invited to submit research or teaching panels.
- Faculty are invited to submit Great Ideas for Teaching Students (GIFTS).

All Paper submissions must include two Microsoft Word file attachments: (1) a file containing a cover sheet listing the paper title and author name(s), affiliation, email, physical address and phone number for all authors, and (2) an anonymized file including a 50-word abstract and the completed paper not to exceed 25 double-spaced pages excluding references and appendices. *Please use "CCA Paper submission" in the subject line*.

Undergraduate and graduate Poster submissions must include two Microsoft Word file attachments: (1) a file containing a cover sheet listing the paper title and author name(s), affiliation, email, physical address and phone number for all authors, and (2) a file including a 50-word abstract and a rationalization of the use of a poster. If accepted, poster presenters must use best practices in designing the poster: Important information should be readable from about 10 feet away; title is short and draws interest; word count of about 300 to 800 words; text is clear and to the point; use of bullets, numbering, and headlines make it easy to read, effective use of graphics, color and fonts; consistent and clean layout; includes acknowledgments, your name and institutional affiliation. *Please use "CCA Poster submission" in the subject line.*

Research or teaching Panel proposals must include one attachment containing the following: (1) a one-page rationale for the proposed panel, (2) a brief (50-word) description for the conference program, and (3) a list of all participants including names, affiliations and contact information (e-mail, physical address and phone number). Please use "CCA Panel proposal" in the subject line.

GIFTS submissions are teaching ideas for any/all courses – Interpersonal, Organizational, Small Group, Media, Gender, Research Methods, Rhetoric, etc. All ideas must be original to the presenter, the submission must not duplicate any other previously published work, including the author's previously published work, and should have been previously implemented in the classroom. All GIFTS submissions will be considered for Top GIFTS recognition. GIFTS submissions are structured into individual sections as follows: (1) Title; (2) Course/Program: The applicable course(s) for which the GIFTS was conducted; (3) Abstract: 100 words; (4) Rationale: A brief explanation of the reason for the activity, research question, hypothesis, etc.; (5) Directions/Method: A description of the process, procedures, etc.; (6) Results/Debrief: A discussion of the results, findings, benefits, etc.; (7) Appendix (if applicable): FYI handouts, lists, examples, etc.; (8) References (if applicable). *Please use "CCA GIFTS submission" in the subject line*.

Common practices of professional ethics tell us that, if submitting traditional papers, authors should expect anonymous review and should not submit the same paper that has been submitted and presented at other academic conferences and/or published and/or accepted for publication. Additionally, if a presenter submits work and that work is accepted for presentation, the presenter has agreed to register for the conference and attend in-person to present the work.
